Homework and Tests

- ✿ READ THE TEXT. Do all reading prior to class.
- ✿ All assignments are expected to be turned in **ON TIME**. Assignments are not group projects. Each student must do her/his own work. There will be no “working together” on assignments unless specifically instructed to do so. Plagiarism is grounds for failure. Copying another student’s work IS PLAGIARISM.
- ✿ Tests will be administered at the conclusion of every chapter. Students who are habitually absent on test days may receive a different test. Section and vocabulary quizzes will be at the discretion of the teacher.
- ✿ Per district policy, **make-up work and tests are due within two days of an EXCUSED absence** and one day for an UNEXCUSED absence. It is YOUR responsibility to acquire and make up missing work/tests.

Category Weights:

- 40% Tests/quizzes

Missing work (unexcused):

Standards and Benchmarks

+ Understands historical continuity and change related to a particular development or theme

Standard 2: Understands the historical perspective and how it may be affected by various factors (i.e., people, problems, events, and ideas)

+ Understands ideas and beliefs held by specific people who influenced history and the role their decisions played in history

+ Understands the effects that specific events, problems, and ideas had on history and specifies how things might have been different in the absence of those events

Standard 3: Understands the emergence of changing America in the early 20th century

+ Understands major social and political issues of the Progressive Era and their influence on various groups in American society (e.g., including suffrage, scandal and minority groups)

+ Understands how the U.S. changed between the post WWI years and the eve of the Great Depression

Standard 4: Understands the Great Depression and WWII

+ Understands the causes of the Great Depression and how it affected American society

+ Understands how the New Deal addressed the Great Depression, transformed American federalism and initiated the welfare state

+ Understands the origin and course of WWII, the character of the war at home and its reshaping of the U.S. role in world affairs

Standard 5: Understands post WWII through the Vietnam Era

+ Understands the economic boom and social transformation of post WWII America (e.g., gender roles, mass media, social, cultural, religious and economic changes)

+ Understands the impact of the Cold War and the Korean and Vietnam conflicts in domestic politics

Standard 6: Understands major contemporary social, economic, and political issues and the groups involved

+ Understands issues concerning the economy, gender, and ethnicity (e.g., issues involving justice and consumer welfare; how interest groups attempted to achieve their goals of equality and justice; the changing goals of the women's movement, and how diverse groups have shaped American life and retain and their cultural heritage)

Standard 7: Understands how the world is organized politically into nations, how nations interact with one another, and issues surrounding U.S. foreign policy

+ Understands the process by which U.S. foreign policy is made

+ Understands major foreign policy positions that have characterized the U.S. relations with the world (e.g., isolated nation, imperial power, and world leader)

+ Understands the changing role of the U.S. in world affairs through WWI (e.g., imperialism, emergence of the U.S. as a world power, nationalism, militarism, and the lack of world order)

+ Understands the impact of the Cold War and the Korean and Vietnam conflicts in international politics
